SCHEDULE I. OF THE

CUSTOMS DUTIES EXEMPTION ORDINANCE, 1924.

(Reprinted from Official Gazette No. 118 of July 1st, 1924, and amended as on 31st of March, 1927.)

The articles specified below are exempt from payment of Customs duties :-

1. Agricultural:

- (a) Agricultural machinery, apparatus, appliances, implements, and component parts thereof, including equipment for dairy and poultry farming presses for agricultural produce, and baling machines, but not including tractors or agricultural vehicles or accessories which may be used for other than agricultural purposes, or mechanics' tools, or harness.
- (b) Vines on American stock, seeds, roots, tubers and bulbs for sowing purposes. Nursery stock, guano and other substances, animal, mineral, or vegetable, artificial or natural, suitable for use as fertilizers or manures. Substances and equipment for the prevention or destruction of pests or diseases in stock, plants, or trees: such as sulphate of copper, arsenic and arsenious acid, arsenite of soda and naphthalin; sprayers, sprinklers, fumigation tents and dipping baths.
 - (c) Animals, including poultry, imported for the improvement of stock.
 - (d) Bees, bee-hives and bee-keeping apparatus.
 - (e) Vaccine, lymph, sera, anti-toxins and rat virus for veterinary purposes.
- (f) Pipes and Flumes imported for drainage and irrigation schemes. Provided that the importer shall pay on importation the full amount of Customs duty thereon at the rate in force and that amount shall be refunded on the production of a certificate from a District Commissioner that all the pipes and flumes imported have been used for bona fide drainage or irrigation schemes.1

2. Industrial :

- (A) The following articles when imported for use in factories and industrial establishments or for purposes of irrigation, drainage, sewage and water supply. Provided that a person who imports articles exempted under this section shall make such declaration as may be prescribed by the Director of Customs in respect of such articles, and shall be liable to the payment of Customs Duty for any articles which are imported or are disposed of after importation otherwise than in accordance with the declaration: without prejudice to any prosecution which may be brought on account of a false declaration.1
- (a) Prime movers and component parts thereof, including boilers and their component parts, electric accumulators, and other machines in which the prime mover is not separable from the operative parts, but not including portable and locomotive engines, steam rollers, fire engines or prime movers utilised as means of transport.
- (b) Machinery and component parts thereof meaning machines or sets of machines to be worked by electric, steam, fire or other power, other than human or animal power, or requiring, before being brought into use, to be fixed with reference to other moving parts.

Provided that the exemption includes machines made of substances other than metal, and belting or materials for driving machinery, but not machinery, tools or implements to be worked by manual or animal labour. And provided also that only such articles shall be admitted as component parts of machinery as are indispensable to the working of the machinery and, owing to their shape or other special quality are not adapted for any other purpose.

(B) Raw materials for certain industries:2

- (a) Cocoa beans.
- (b) Sesame Seed. Cotton Seed. Linseed. Sunflower Seed. Gingelly Seed. Castor Seed. Colza Seed.
- Palm Seed. Olive Seed.
- Olive Oil. Horse, cattle and camel hides, raw or dried. Sheep and goat skins, raw or dried. Other skins, raw or dried, not including furs.
- (e) The bark, peel and extracts of oak, chestnut, walnut, pomegranate, mimosa, quebracho, mangrove and valonia.
- Caustic soda.
- Aniline and Indigo dyes. Other dves.
- Packing paper for Oranges. Copra.³ Mother of pearl shells.4
- Cotton varns. Silk and artificial silk yarn. Woollen and worsted yarns.
 - The yarns of linen, flax, jute and hemp.6 Cork wood.5 (m) Sheets of tin plate.7

Provided that in case of dispute as to whether any imported article falls under this clause the matter shall be referred to the Director of Customs, whose decision shall be final.

3. Passengers' Baggage.

The bona fide baggage of a passenger, the property of and accompanied by such passenger, including:

- (a) necessary and appropriate wearing apparel and personal effects;
- (b) binoculars, photographic cameras and typewriters;
- (c) instruments and tools for the professional use of passengers.

Baggage shall not include such articles as the following:

Arms, ammunition, alcoholic liquors, tobacco in any form, perfumes, furniture, carpets, and provisions. Provided that duty shall not be leviable on manufactured tobacco (including cigars and cigarettes) not exceeding one quarter kilogramme in weight or on wines or spirits not exceeding one eighth litre, and on other dutiable articles if the duty thereon does not exceed PT.5.

Bona-fide baggage entering Palestine within thirty days of the arrival of passengers may be included in the exemption at the discretion of the Director of Customs.

4. Settlers' Effects.

The effects imported by any person who is an immigrant within the meaning of the Immigration Ordinance, 1920, including:

- (a) household and personal effects, furniture, pictures, linen, cutlery, crockery, silver and plated wares, sewing machines, musical instruments, perambulators, and similar articles for domestic use, whether new or used;
- (b) implements, instruments, and tools of trade, occupation or employment;
- (c) carts, waggons, and other agricultural vehicles, livestock and poultry, the property of a settler or group of settlers and necessary for their occupation;
- (d) fodder for livestock and food for poultry mentioned in subsection (c).

Provided that in all cases the articles are in the actual possession of the settler or that their entry is declared at the time of his arrival and takes place within the period of 90 days from the date of his arrival, and that a declaration is made that the goods are not intended for sale. And provided also that in case of dispute as to whether any of the articles are the bona-fide property of the settler, or in the case of articles specified in subsections (b) and (c) are necessary for his occupation or employment, the matter shall be referred to the Director of Customs whose decision shall be final.

5. Effects of Officers of the Palestine Government and Members of His Majesty's Forces.

(a) The effects included in subsection (a) of Section 4 when imported by officers and men of any of His Majesty's Forces serving in Palestine.1

(b) Uniforms of an officer of H.M. Forces and uniforms prescribed by Regulation for Officers of the Palestine Government including the necessary arms, badges and equipment thereto.

(c) Officers' camp furniture and fittings imported as a necessary part of their equipment, namely in respect of an officer of H.M. Forces or of the Palestine Government, one tent, table, chair, bed, mattress, mosquito-curtain, bath and canteen.

(d) Goods imported for H.M. Forces on satisfactory proof to the Director of Customs that they have been imported solely for such purpose and are the property of His Majesty.

(e) Goods imported by or consigned direct to officers or men on board vessels of H.M. Navy for their personal use or consumption on board such vessels.

(f) Regimental plate, furniture and other Mess fittings, and band instruments the property of any Mess or the joint property of the officers of any Mess.

(g) 1 The effects included in subsection (a) of Section 4 when imported by officers of the Palestine Government appointed from the United Kingdom or any foreign country on taking up their appointment or on marriage; provided that in all cases the articles are in the actual possession of the officer, or their entry is declared at the time of his arrival and takes place within the period of 90 days from the date of his arrival, or within the period of 90 days from the allocation to him of housing accommodation by the Government, and that a declaration is made that the goods are not intended for sale. And provided also that in case of dispute as to whether any of the articles are the bona fide property of the officer, the matter shall be referred to the Director of Customs, whose decision shall be final.

6. Ships and Boats.

(a) Ships, launches, lighters, boats and barges and integral constructional parts thereof. Provided that when condemned or handed over to be broken up, duty shall be paid on the hull and all fittings according to the Customs Tariff that may then be in force.

(b) Oars and anchors.3

7. Articles imported by Educational, Scientific and Charitable Institutions.

(a) Equipment, medical supplies, surgical appliances and instruments consigned to a hospital, asylum or dispensary, which is maintained entirely or principally by a charitable society and is certified by the Director of the Department of Health to be a bona-fide hospital, asylum or dispensary so main-

(b) Equipment, furniture, technical apparatus or machinery in the nature of fixtures and component parts thereof, and educational material, (not including raw material and manufactured or partly manufactured articles intended for sale either in their existing condition or in a completed state) consigned to a school or institution for the purpose of education or research, which is maintained by a Religious Community, or by a responsible person or body approved by the High Commissioner in Council and is certified by the Director of the Department of Education to be a school or institution for the purpose of education or research so maintained.

(c) Articles mentioned in paragraph (b), and also clothing for the use of the inmates, consigned to an orphanage or almshouse, which is maintained by a Religious Community or a charitable society.

(d) Works of art, scientific or artistic collections and specimens or objects of archæological or scientific interest consigned to a museum or a library which is maintained for the public benefit or attached to an educational institution and in either case is approved by the High Commissioner in

(e) Instruments and scientific appliances for the purpose of excavation and archæological study, consigned to an archæological society which is approved by the High Commissioner in Council.

(f) Uniform and badges for Officers of the Society; Humane killers; Cartridges for humane killers; Movable Lethal Chambers; and Disinfecting equipment (rubber gloves, white jackets, sprayers), when imported by the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.²

Provided in every case that

(1) the articles shall be consigned and invoiced direct to the hospital, asylum, dispensary, school, orphanage, almshouse or scientific, educational or archæological institution as the case may be or to an authorised representative thereof and not to an agent; and that the representative shall, before the articles are delivered, give a written declaration to the Director of the Department of Customs, Excise and Trade that the articles are required for the sole use of the institution and will not be used for purpose of trade; and

(2) the decision of the High Commissioner. whether any article, or the institution to which it is consigned, falls within one of the classes specified in this part of the Schedule shall be final.

8. Miscellaneous.

(a) i. Printed books, bound or unbound. Printed matter, namely, newspapers (other than newspapers imported for packing purposes), periodicals, music, other than roll music; trade catalogues, price lists; photographs and all printed or lithographed matter used or intended to be used solely for advertising purposes.

ii. Printing and bookbinding machinery. Printers' types.

(b) Architectural and scientific designs, diagrams and all kinds of drawing material, plans, maps and atlases.

(c) Samples, provided they are not such as can be sold as merchandise.

(d) Coffins containing corpses and funeral caskets containing ashes.

(e) Memorial tablets and brasses, tombstones and ornaments for graves.

(f) Articles imported by or for the use of the Government.

(g) Fire-engines, steam-rollers and mechanical vehicles used exclusively for municipal purposes when imported by Municipalities.

(h) Gold bullion and specie, bank notes and other paper currency.

(i) Articles re-imported into Palestine within one year from the date of export from Palestine subject to the following conditions:

(i) The Director of Customs, Excise and Trade shall be satisfied that the goods re-imported are identical in all respects with the goods exported, and if the goods re-imported are foreign goods, that the import duties were paid at the time of the original importation.

(ii) If the goods are subject to payment of Excise duties that such duties are paid at the rate in force at the time of re-importation.

(iii) That any drawback which was obtained on the exportation of the goods is repaid in respect of such part of the goods as is re-imported.

(j) Provisions imported into Palestine by the International Company of Wagons-Lits, exclusively for consumption on the Dining Cars of the Company: provided that the exemption shall not apply to any wines, spirits, tobacco or mineral waters.

(k) 3 Building materials imported by the Imperial War Graves Commission.

(1) 4 Coal, Anthracite, and Crude Petroleum.

5 Solar oil, Diesel oil and Mazut.

(m) 6 Badges of Boy Scouts or Girl Guides certified as such by the Director of Education.

(n) 7 Empty Sacks.

Empty barrels and staves.

8 Bottles, jars, demijohns and irondrums.

(o) 8 Capsules for bottles.

8 Corks.

(p) 7 Wooden and iron hoops for barrels.

(q) 8 Dental, surgical and medical appliances and apparatus.

(r) 8 Disinfectants.

(s) 8 Drugs, raw and prepared.

(t) 8 Life Belts.

(u) 8 Optical appliances other than binoculars and telescopes.

(v) 8 Sulphur.

(w) 8 Tools and implements used in handicrafts.

(x) 8 Apparatus for the extinction of fire.

(y) 9 Surgical and Dental Dressings.

(z) 10 Cattle.

PROHIBITED AND RESTRICTED IMPORTS AND EXPORTS.

A .- IMPORTS.

- 1. The importation of the following articles is prohibited:-
 - (a) Drawings, engravings, and all printed or manuscript matter of an immoral or seditious character whether as merchandise or wrappings.
 - (b) (i) Hashish or any preparation of Hashish.
 - (ii) Any preparation of Cannabis Indica similar to Hashish.
 - (iii) Prepared Opium.
 - (c) Shaving brushes exported from Japan, China, Manchuria and Korea.
 - (Shaving brushes which have been exported from Europe are subject to inspection by the Medical Authorities.)
 - (d) Matches made with white phosphorus.
 - (e) (1) All essences or extracts of oils intended or suitable for use in the manufacture of spurious or imitated alcoholic beverages, including in particular the following:
 - i. Essence for Brandy or Cognac.
 - ii. Cognac Oil.
 - iii. Essence for Champagne.
 - iv. Essence for Malaga.
 - v. Essence for Medoc.
 - vi. Essence for Port.
 - vii. Essence for Rum.
 - viii. Essence for Vermouth.
 - ix. Essence for Whisky.
 - (2) Any bottle, cask or other vessel containing wine or spirituous liquors, which does not bear a label clearly indicating the true nature of the contents, the full name of the manufacturer or responsible exporting agent, and the country of origin.
- 2. The following articles may be imported only under special conditions:-
 - (a) Blasting explosives and saltpetre, under licence from the Commandant of Police.
 - (b) Firearms and ammunition, sporting guns and sporting gun ammunition, under Permit to be obtained from the District Commissioner.
 - (c) Salt, under licence from the Director of Customs, Excise and Trade.
 - (d) Living plants of any description and bees, on production of a certificate signed by a competent Agriculturist in the country of origin, certifying that they have been examined and found to be free from disease.
- The importation of the following articles is only permitted under a special certificate issued by the Chief Secretary :
 - i. Raw Opium.
 - ii. Medicinal Opium.
 - iii. All preparations containing more than 0.2 per cent. of morphin or more than 0.2 per cent. of cocaine, including the anti-opium remedies.
 - iv. Heroin, its salts and preparations containing more than o'r per cent. of heroin.
 - v. All derivatives of morphine, cocaine, or their respective salts, codeine, and any other alkaloid of opium, which may be prescribed by Order of the High Commissioner.
 - vi. Tinctures and extracts or other medicinal preparations of Cannabis Indica.

(Intending importers will make application to the Director, Department of Health, on Local Form O.M.162, which can be obtained at any District Health Office before placing their Order for any of the above mentioned drugs with any firm outside Palestine. If the application is approved, the Director, Department of Health will issue the certificate in duplicate. The importer will then forward one copy of this certificate with his order so that the exporter may present this copy to his Government for approval to export.)

Poisonous substances will be delivered by the Customs House Authority only to persons holding a Poison Permit of the Department of Health or to licensed Pharmacists or to other persons provided with special written authority from the Government.

B .- GOODS MANIFESTED IN TRANSIT.

Goods entering Palestine manifested in transit to other destinations may be allowed to proceed with the following exceptions :-

- (a) i. Hashish or any preparation of Hashish.
 - ii. Any preparation of Cannabis Indica similar to Hashish.
 - iii. Prepared Opium.
- (b) Drawings, engravings and all printed or manuscript matter of an immoral or seditious character whether as merchandise or wrappings.
- (c) Blasting explosives and saltpetre, unless under licence issued by the Commandant of Police.
- (d) Firearms, Ammunition, and Explosives, unless under licence from the District

C.-EXPORTS.

- I. The exportation of the following Articles from Palestine is prohibited :-
 - (a) i. Hashish or any preparation of Hashish.
 - ii. Any preparation of Cannabis Indica similar to Hashish.
 - iii. Prepared Opium.
 - (b) Animal Manure.
- 2. The exportation of Antiquities is permitted only under special licence issued and signed by the Inspector of Antiquities.

REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE IMPORTATION AND EXPORTATION OF ARMS OR AMMUNITION.1

SECTION A.

Regulations relating to Arms and Ammunition Imported or Exported by Licensed Dealers.

- 1. The prescribed Ports of entry for the import of Arms or Ammunition shall be Haifa and Jaffa. The prescribed places of exit for the export of Arms or Ammunition shall be all Customs Stations in Palestine and Kantara.
- 2. Licensed dealers importing or exporting Arms or Ammunition shall obtain a permit of import or export prior to the arrival or despatch of the consignment.

Consignments in respect of which no permit is produced to the local Customs Authority within 21 days from the date of receipt into the Customs Stores will be confiscated and disposed of in the manner directed by the Director of Customs in consultation with the Commandant of Police. In order to defray the cost of the special supervision required to ensure the safety of these consignments, storage fees will be charged at the rate of double the usual tariff. In the case of a single firearm or packet of ammunition, the storage charged will be levied at the rate of PT. 2 per consignment for every day during which the articles are in store.

SECTION B.

Regulations relating to Arms and Ammunition Imported or Exported by Private Individuals.

- 1. The Prescribed Ports and Stations of entry for the import of Arms or Ammunition shall be :--
 - (a) In the case of Arms or Ammunition accompanied by the owner, Haifa, Jaffa, Kantara, Samakh and Ras el Nakurah;
 - (b) In the case of Arms or Ammunition contained in luggage forwarded under transit, any other Customs Station in Palestine.
- 2. The prescribed Ports and places of exit for the export of Arms or Ammunition shall be all Customs Stations in Palestine and Kantara.

INSTRUCTIONS REGARDING IMPORT AND EXPORT OF DANGEROUS DRUGS.

(Published in Official Gazette No. 181 of 16th February, 1927.)

A certificate for the import or export of dangerous drugs shall be granted by the Director, Department of Health, to a licensed pharmacist or in a special case to a licensed doctor in charge of a medical institution maintained by a religious or charitable association.

The Director shall use his discretion in the granting of such certificate and ensure that the legitimate requirements of the country for dangerous drugs are not exceeded. He shall, as far as possible, grant the certificate of import or export only when the dangerous drugs are to be obtained from or despatched to a country which is a signatory to the International Opium Convention, 1925.

No consignment of dangerous drugs which is exported from one country to another shall be permitted to pass through Palestine or the ports or territorial waters thereof, unless a copy of the authorisation for export or diversion certificate, as the case may be, which accompanied the consignment is produced to the Customs Authorities for examination. Provided that this clause shall not apply to the transport of dangerous drugs by post or by aircraft.

INSTRUCTIONS REGARDING THE IMPORTATION AND EXPORTATION OF ANTIQUITIES.

(Published in Official Gazette No. 173 dated 16th October, 1926.)

IMPORTATION.

- 1. All antiquities must be declared to the Customs Authorities immediately on arrival in Palestine.
- 2. Antiquities imported into Palestine from countries other than Syria are liable to an Import Duty of 12 per cent. ad valorem.
- 3. (a) The importation of antiquities into Palestine from Syria is governed by the Syria-Palestine Customs Agreement, published in the Gazette of the 1st October, 1921, and by the agreement as to the importation of antiquities published in the Gazette of the 16th April, 1926.
- (b) No antiquity shall be permitted to enter Palestine from Syria or the Lebanon unless its exportation has been sanctioned by a licence issued by the competent authority in the territory of export.
- (c) Antiquities of Syrian origin accompanied by a certificate from the Syrian Customs Authorities to that effect, and antiquities not of Syrian origin, which are imported into Palestine accompanied by a certificate from the Syrian Customs Authorities stating that the Customs duties on the antiquities have been credited to the Palestine Customs Administration, will be admitted into Palestine free of import duty.
- (d) Antiquities not accompanied by either of such certificates are liable to import duty of 12 per cent, ad valorem.

RE-IMPORTATION.

4. Antiquities exported from Palestine and subsequently re-imported will be admitted free of duty, provided that re-importation takes place within six months from the date of exportation and that they are accompanied by the Permit to Export issued by the Department of Antiquities on their previous exportation, and by the receipt for Export Duty paid at that time.

EXPORTATION.

- 5. (a) The exportation of antiquities from Palestine is governed by Chapter VII. of the Antiquities Ordinance published in Gazette No. 29, of the 15th of October, 1920.
- (b) Under this Ordinance all antiquities must be accompanied by a Permit to Export granted by the Department of Antiquities.
- (c) All antiquities must be declared, and the Permit to Export must be exhibited to the Customs Authorities, on departure from Palestine, but packages of antiquities sealed with the seal of the Department of Antiquities, and bearing within the official stamp of that Department the number and date of the Permit relating to them, may be exempted from further examination at the discretion of the Customs
- (d) All antiquities exported are liable to an export duty of 10 per cent. ad valorem, which is payable to the Department of Antiquities before the Permit to Export is granted.

RE-EXPORTATION.

6. Antiquities upon which import duty has been originally collected, if re-exported within six months from the date of importation must be accompanied by a Permit to Export, as above mentioned. The Customs Authority will refund the import duty originally collected, less r per cent., ad valorem, provided that it is satisfied by the production either of a certificate of import for purposes of re-exportation or of other documents that import duty was originally collected.

Provided always that when a blue flag with a white ball (denoting rough weather) is hoisted at the office of the Port Officer, fares not exceeding double the fares in the tariff may be charged. And provided also that when a red flag with a white square in the centre is hoisted at the office of such Officer (denoting foul weather) these rates shall not apply.

Immigrants and tourists may be conveyed at special rates by mutual arrangements, provided that such special rates shall in no case exceed the rates allowed by the tariff, nor be less than these, by more than 50 per cent.

2. If the rent on any consignment of unmanufactured tobacco or tombac remains unpaid for a year, the consignment shall be deemed to be unclaimed and shall be sold by Customs Authority.

All goods in respect of which direct delivery has been granted by the Collector of Customs will be subject to Store Rent at the rates specified in the above Regulation on the expiration of forty-eight hours from the hour of landing.3

3. Goods in transit for Syria or Egypt may remain in the Customs House Stores, Yards, or other places, where they will be under Customs control, free of store rent for 14 days, exclusive of the day of landing and the day of clearance.

4. Goods re-exported or removed to another Port in Palestine from the Customs Store, Yard or other place under Customs control, and proved to the satisfaction of the Director of Customs to have been landed in error, may be exempt from rent for a period not exceeding two calendar months.

5. Goods which have been landed and deposited in the Customs Store at any port in Palestine, and declared at the time of landing to be destined for any foreign port, or for any other port in Palestine, and eventually removed to such port, shall be exempt from store rent for any period not exceeding one calendar month; but after the expiration of that period shall be charged with store rent at the above rates.

6. No charge will be made for goods transported by rail in bond for any clear days during which they were in the railway trucks.

7. The Director of Customs may allow a reduction in store rent up to 50% in special cases, provided that no reduction shall be allowed when less than 10 days' store rent is due.

8. In the cases of a vessel discharging cargo for a period of more than one day, the last day of discharge shall be deemed to be the day of landing for the purpose of the calculation of rent.

9. Stores imported for His Majesty's Forces or for the Palestine Government shall be exempted from payment of store rent, provided they are removed from the Customs Stores and Yards without delay. Any delay in clearance should be reported by the Principal Customs Officer to the proper Authorities.

SECTION III.

COUNCILS, ASSEMBLIES, DISTRICT ADMINISTRATION, MUNICIPALITIES AND OTHER BODIES.

Sub-Section 1. GOUNCILS.

EXECUTIVE COUNCIL.

It is provided in the Instructions passed under the Royal Sign Manual and Signet dated the 14th of August, 1922, that the Executive Council of Palestine shall consist of the persons for the time being lawfully discharging the functions of Chief Secretary, Attorney General and Treasurer, who shall be styled ex officio Members of the Executive Council, and such other persons holding office in the Public Service of Palestine as the High Commissioner in pursuance of instructions from His Majesty, through one of the Principal Secretaries of State, may from time to time appoint by an Instrument under the Public Seal of Palestine, who shall be styled Official Members of the Executive Council.

Whenever upon any special occasion the High Commissioner desires to obtain the advice of any persons within Palestine, relating to affairs therein, he may, by an Instrument under the Public Seal of Palestine, summon for such special occasion any such persons as Extraordinary Members.

Whenever any Member, other than an ex officio Member, shall die, or resign his seat in the Council, or be suspended from the exercise of his functions as a Member of the Council, or be absent from Palestine or be acting in an office the holder of which is an ex officio Member, the High Commissioner may, by an Instrument under the Public Seal, provisionally appoint some person to be temporarily a Member of the Council in his stead.

Such person shall cease to be a Member if his appointment is disallowed by His Majesty, or if the Member in whose place he was appointed shall be released from suspension, or declared by the High Commissioner to be capable of again discharging his functions in the Council, or shall return to Palestine, or shall cease to sit in the Council as an ex officio Member. Provided that when any person shall be lawfully discharging the functions of more than one of the offices the holders of which are ex officio Members of the Council, the High Commissioner may by an Instrument under the Public Seal, appoint a fit person to be provisionally a Member of the Council so long as the functions of the said offices shall continue to be discharged by one person continue to be discharged by one person.

It is provided in the Palestine Order in Council, 1922, as amended by the Palestine (Amendment) Order in Council, 1923, that an Advisory Council shall be constituted by an Order by the High Commissioner with the approval of the Secretary of State. It is further provided by an Order of the High Commissioner approved by the Secretary of State dated the 20th December, 1926, that the Advisory Council shall be constituted by the persons for the time being performing the duties of the officers mentioned in the third column of the schedule below.

The function of the Advisory Council is to advise the High Commissioner as to proposed legislation and no ordinance may be promulgated by the High Commissioner until the Advisory Council has been consulted thereon.

Sub-Section 2. ADMINISTRATION.

Palestine is divided into the Northern and Southern Districts, under British District Commissioners with their headquarters at Haifa and Jaffa respectively, and the Division of Jerusalem under a Deputy District Commissioner having his headquarters at Jerusalem.

The Northern and Southern Districts are divided into areas and sub-districts under the administration of British and Palestinian officers respectively.

Sub-Section 3. LOCAL GOVERNMENT.

(a) MUNICIPALITIES.

Provision is made for the establishment of Municipal Councils under the Ottoman Wilayet Municipal Law dated the 5th of October, 1877 — 27th Ramadan 1294 A.H.

No municipal elections have been held since the Occupation.

CURRENCY, WEIGHTS AND MEASURES AND CALENDARS.

CURRENCY.

Legal tender consists of notes of the National Bank of Egypt and Egyptian silver and nickel coins. The Egyptian pound is divided into 100 piastres or 1,000 milliemes.

WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

The metric system is followed by the Government, and its use regulated by Ordinance, but the local weights and measures are still commonly employed. These vary greatly throughout the country, but are, subject to considerable fluctuation, as follows:-

SECTION XIII.

INDUSTRY AND PRODUCTION, WAGES AND COST OF LIVING.

INDUSTRY AND PRODUCTION.

Palestine is essentially an agricultural country, and it is only since the British occupation that industries have begun to develop. Before the war the manufacture of wine was the only industry existing on a large scale, and a few factories in Nablus and elsewhere made soap from olive oil by simple

TOBACCO GROWING.

The remarkable enthusiasm displayed for tobacco planting during 1924 resulted in the production of a crop largely in excess of local requirements. A large surplus caused an inevitable reaction, and the area planted with tobacco decreased from 27,137 dunums in 1924 to 11,676 dunums in 1925. This, however, may prove a blessing in disguise by ensuring the production of higher-grade tobacco leaf. The production of tobacco decreased from 1,845 tons in 1924 to 678 tons in 1925.

INTRODUCTION OF NEW AGRICULTURAL STAPLES.

The introduction of new staples promising higher acreage results is being organised by the Department of Agriculture, selection being made of crops the production and preparation of which call for no ment of Agriculture, selection being made of crops the production and preparation of which can not not considerable outlay on machinery and no special expenditure except for labour. Oil seeds, such as ground nuts, linseed, sunflower and soya beans, and fibres such as cotton, flax and hemp, which find a ready market locally in oil and textile mills, soap factories, etc., are being encouraged. The past season was not favourable from a weather point of view, but good results were obtained at forest nurseries with ground-nuts, flax, and sunflowers, where a deficient rainfall was supplemented by irrigation. Banana cultivation is increasing. Subsidiary industries for the production of perfumes, medicinal barks, etc., have been established. Liquorice roots from the Jordan Valley are in good demand.

INDUSTRY.

Early in 1925 industrial conditions were favourable and a number of important factories were established. A silk-weaving factory, cotton-spinning and a steam tannery commenced operations at Tel-Aviv.

A match factory at Acre, a cement factory at Haifa, and a factory for the distillation of essential oils and the manufacture of perfumes was opened at Benjamina.

The most important stimulant to local industry has been the establishment of electrical power stations at Tel-Aviv, Haifa and Tiberias (the latter two in 1925) by the Palestine Electric Company, Ltd., and the Palestine Electric Corporation, Ltd. So great has been the demand for electricity at Tel-Aviv and Jaffa, that the two engines, each of 500 h.p., which were first installed in the power station here had to be supplemented by a third one of 250 h.p., and later by a fourth of 1,000 h.p. Electricity is now also supplied from the Tel-Aviv station to Petah-Tikvah, the largest Jewish colony in the neighbourhood. It is expected shortly to start work on the establishment of hydro-electric power from the Jordan. The first hydro-electric station will produce 24,000 h.p. for 24 hours a day; others can be added as conditions may demand, up to a total output of 300,000 h.p.

THE SOAP INDUSTRY.

The soap-making industry, the most important of the pre-war industries with the exception of wine manufacture, is progressing, and new methods and machinery are being introduced by manufacturers. The production is increasing, and during 1925, 5,855 tons of laundry soap, valued at £E.247,725, were exported, showing an increase over the previous year of 1,046 tons, valued at £E.43,834. Toilet soap of an improved quality is now being manufactured. The "Shemen" Oil Company at Haifa, a modern factory established with a capital of approximately £E.250,000, commenced manufacturing laundry and toilet soap on a limited scale. A number of small soap factories have been established during the year in Tel-Aviv and Jaffa.

BUILDING MATERIALS.

This industry had a relatively satisfactory year, although it has suffered considerably from the decline towards the end of the year in the building operations. The Portland Cement Company "Nesher" of Haifa commenced operations in October. The cement produced by this factory compares favourably with foreign brands. The capital invested is approximately £E.300,000, and the factory can produce

FLOUR MILLING

Flour milling is progressing. The Grands Moulins de Palestine erected an additional factory for the manufacture of Matzot (Passover bread). Prospects for this new enterprise are good.

TOBACCO AND CIGARETTE MANUFACTURE.

Seven tobacco and cigarette factories and seven tombac factories were working regularly in 1925. Over-300 tons of cigarettes were manufactured. The industry is progressing steadily, but a certain amount of tobacco is still smuggled into the country, with a resulting loss to manufacturers and to the

SALT PRODUCTION.

The sale of salt is a Government monopoly. A company is producing salt at Athlit by the evaporation of sea water in artificial basins. The output of this company was 5,500 tons of salt in 1925, as compared with 2,600 tons in 1924. Sales of salt by the Government amounted to 4,794 tons in 1925, as

FURNITURE MAKING.

Competition, particularly from Syria, is very strong; but the industry is making headway.

TEXTILES AND SILK.

The only factory now working at anything approaching capacity is the "Lodzia" textile factory, employing about 100 hands, and manufacturing hosiery and underclothing from imported yarns.

The Delfiner silk factory, which opened early in 1925, closed down, but has recently been re-opened.

ALCOHOL MANUFACTURING.

Three factories are producing alcohol; in the country; these have formed a syndicate in order to reduce the cost of production and eliminate competition. The production was 52,456 kilos. of alcohol in 1924 and 261,894 kilos. in 1925.

MOTHER-OF-PEARL INDUSTRY.

The Bethlehem industry progressed during the year owing to the success it obtained at the British Empire Exhibition, where important sales of curios and articles of piety were effected.

MATCH MANUFACTURE.

There are two match factories in Palestine, one at Acre and the other at Tel-Aviv. The industry is hampered by the high cost of production.

GENERAL.

Over 700 small industrial concerns are at work manufacturing all sorts of goods, There are brass and iron foundries, printing presses, and factories manufacturing confectionery, pottery, and furniture, and many persons are employed in other trades. Industry in Palestine is still in an embryonic stage and is handicapped by the lack of raw materials, the relatively high cost of production, and transport. Longterm industrial credits are lacking. The more important industries were not seriously affected by the financial depression of the latter part of the year, and prospects for the future are promising for those industries which can obtain their raw materials in the country.

PROMOTION OF TRADE AND INDUSTRY.

Most of the new industries find their development retarded by the high cost of living, with its corollary of a high cost of production, and many of them ask for measures of protection. The Government policy in these matters has been to grant customs exemption in respect of raw materials, and to assist the development of the export trade.

Olive oil for industrial purposes, caustic soda, various seeds for the extraction of oils, hides and skins, dyes, cotton, woollen and silk yarns, mother-of-pearl shells, sulphur, printers' types, tools and implements, bottles, etc., were exempted from customs import duty during the year in order to encourage local industries. The export duty on all articles, with the exception of antiquities, was abolished early in 1926.

With a view to encouraging agriculture, the land tax on tobacco has been abolished, and the tithe on cotton suspended for a certain period, and the agricultural tithe has been reduced from 121 to

The higher money wages of Jewish workers, however, do not in many cases reflect a higher level of real wages.

INSUFFICIENTLY PREPAID CORRESPONDENCE.

Correspondence of every kind, unprepaid or insufficiently prepaid, is liable to a charge equal to double the amount of the deficiency, such charge to be paid on delivery. In the case of Palestine, this charge will not be less than 4 m/ms.

INSURANCE OF LETTERS.

The Insured Letter Service extends to Czechoslovakia, Denmark, Holland, India, Poland, Roumania, New Zealand, Spain, Tunis.

Letters may be insured for the whole or part of the value of the contents, not exceeding the real value of the contents, and the cost of packing up to a maximum value of £E.119.

The insurance fee for letters, whether addressed to places in Palestine or to other countries mentioned, is 20 m/ms for the first £E.12 of insured value or part thereof, and thence by steps of 7 m/ms for each additional £E.12 or part thereof. This fee is in addition to the ordinary rate of postage.

RE-DIRECTION.

CUSTOM HOUSE DECLARATION.

Two custom declarations must be attached to the Despatch Note of every foreign parcel.

UNDELIVERABLE PARCELS.

Undelivered parcels are disposed of according to the sender's instructions on the reverse side of the Despatch Note. When such instructions are not furnished the parcel is returned to origin at the expiration of one month from the date of receipt in Palestine.

EXPRESS DELIVERY

Express delivery facilities are available in Jerusalem, Jaffa, Haifa and Tel-Aviv only,

FREE DELIVERY.

Letters and packets are delivered free by postman.

COLLECTION OF TRADE CHARGES.

REMBOURSEMENT SYSTEM.

A "Cash on Delivery" Parcel Post Service with Great Britain only is in operation. So far as posting in Palestine is concerned, the service is at present confined to the Offices of Jerusalem, Jaffa, Haifa, Nazareth and Bethlehem. In the service with Great Britain "Cash on Delivery" parcels may be addressed to any destination in Palestine.

FEES PAYABLE.

The sender must prepay, by means of postage stamps affixed to the Despatch Note, a special Cash on Delivery fee at the rate of 1 per cent. of the amount of the Trade Charge plus a fixed fee of 10 m/ms per parcel. These fees are additional to the ordinary postage and other charges.

INSURANCE OF PARCELS AND BOXES.

The maximum amount for which a parcel can be insured is £E.119. A parcel may not be insured for an amount exceeding the real value of the contents and the cost of packing.

Insured parcels must be very strongly packed and sealed in accordance with the regulations.

The fee for insurance, including registration but in addition to the ordinary postage, is 20 m/ms for the first £E.12 or part thereof of the insured value and 7 m/ms for each additional £E.12 or part thereof.

Every insured parcel containing coin or bullion, watches, precious stones, jewellery, or any article of gold or silver, must be closed in a strong box or case (measuring, if the contents are jewellery exceeding £E.100 in value, at least 105 centimetres in length and girth combined), must be sewn up, or otherwise fastened, in a wrapper of linen, canvas, strong paper, or other substantial material and must have the address written on its actual covering. The seals must be placed along the edges of each join or loose flap at distances of not more than 75 millimetres apart.

Parcels may not exceed 5 kilogrammes in weight except in the case of parcels for Great Britain and Syria.

The maximum length allowed is 105 centimetres.

The maximum length and girth combined, 180 centimetres.

Parcels addressed to foreign countries should generally be packed in tin, strong wood, canvas, linen or similar material and with due regard to the length of journey, conditions of transit, climate, etc., not merely in paper or cardboard, in a manner calculated adequately to protect the contents from damage through contact with other parcels.

An Advice of Delivery of a registered or insured parcel may be obtained on payment of the sum of 13 m/ms either at the time of posting or subsequently.

INSURED BOX SERVICE (Foreign only).

Articles of gold and silver, precious stones, jewellery and other articles of a like nature which are prohibited from transmission in insured letters, may generally be sent in the LETTER MAILS as insured boxes.

The undermentioned classes of articles are prohibited from transmission in insured boxes to Great Britain :-

Clocks, watches and the principal parts thereof.

Cinematograph films; letters or notes which may serve as a substitute for correspondence. Current coin, bank-notes, securities payable to bearer, bonds and articles included in the category of commercial papers. It is, however, permissible to insert in the packet an open invoice and also a simple copy of the address of the packet and the sender.

INSURED BOX SERVICE-continued.

An insured box must not exceed 1 kilogramme in weight or measure more than 30 centimetres in breadth and 10 centimetres in depth. The sides of the wooden box must be at least 8 millimetres thick.

It must be tied round cross-wise with a single strong string (not two or more pieces joined together), the two ends of the string being held firmly together under a seal of fine wax bearing a private mark. All seals on the four sides of the packet must be identical with that used for sealing the ends of the string.

The boxes must not be wrapped in paper.

Insured boxes are subject to the Customs Regulations and must be accompanied by the appropriate forms which should be most carefully prepared.

No box can be insured for more than its actual value or the limit of insurance allowed.

Postage and insurance fee must be fully prepaid.

The rate of postage is 8 m/ms per 50 grammes with a minimum charge of 40 m/ms. The fee for insurance and the limits of insurance are the same as for insured letters to places abroad.

An Advice of Delivery of an insured box may be obtained on payment of a fee of 13 m/ms either at the time of posting or subsequently.

Ordinary Inland Money Orders are not issued for sums of £E.1 or less. Attention is directed to the facilities afforded by the Palestine Postal Order Service for the remittance of small amounts.

An Advice of Payment may be obtained on payment of a fee of 13 m/ms.

Telegraph:

Inland Telegraph Money Orders are issued at the foregoing rates of commission, plus the cost of the telegram of advice and supplementary fee of 10 m/ms for each order.

FOREIGN.

Ordinary:

Foreign Money Orders for most countries are issued up to an amount exceeding £40 sterling per single order (except for Egypt, Syria and Trans Jordan, for which countries the maximum amount is £E.40; and the United States of America, for which the maximum amount is \$200).

A commission of 1 per cent. per £E.1 or part thereof is charged. Minimum charge 25 m/ms.

In the case of certain countries a varying percentage is deducted from the amount of the order before payment.

An Advice of Payment for Money Orders destined for most countries may be obtained on payment of a fee of 13 m/ms.

Ordinary Money Orders for payment in Egypt are not issued for sums of £E.1 or less. Attention is drawn to the facilities afforded by the Palestine Postal Order Service for the remittance of such amounts.

Telegraph:

Foreign Telegraph Money Orders are only issued for payment in Egypt and Great Britain. The charges are the same as for ordinary Foreign Money Orders plus the cost of the telegram of advice and a supplementary fee of 25 m/ms for each order.

No single Foreign Telegraph Money Order may be issued for an amount exceeding £E.40.

An Advice of Payment may be obtained on payment of a fee of 13 m/ms or the cost of two extra words if it is desired to include the instruction in the Telegram of Advice.

British Postal Orders are paid in Great Britain and most countries in the British Empire except Australia, where they are only paid when issued to soldiers. They are not paid in Egypt, Trans Jordan or Palestine when issued in Palestine.

Palestine stamps not exceeding 3 in number or 20 m/ms in value may be affixed to British Postal Orders in extension to their face value.

Payment:

British Postal Orders issued in Great Britain or other countries of the British Empire are paid in Palestine at the standard conversion rates of their face value plus the value of any stamps which may have been affixed in extension thereof except postage stamps of British Agencies, if their value has been overprinted in local currency. The value of British postage stamps overprinted with the words "Morocco Agencies" or "Levant" will, however, be paid.

PALESTINE PROHIBITIONS.

LETTER POST.

Betting and lottery circulars and tickets; advertisements relating to the treatment or to any preparation for the prevention of venereal diseases; arms and ammunitions (except sporting guns and sporting ammunition which may be imported under permit from the Police Authorities); explosives (blasting explosives and saltpetre may be imported under permit from the Police Authorities); salt; drawings, engravings and all printed or manuscript matter of an immoral or seditious character, whether as merchandise or wrappings; hashish or any preparation of hashish; any preparation of cannabis indica similar in character to hashish; prepared opium; (the following are admitted under permit from the Department of Health: raw opium; medicinal opium, all preparations containing more than 0.2 per cent. of morphine or more than 0.1 per cent. of cocaine including the "anti-opium" remedies; heroin, its salts and preparations, containing more than 0.1 per cent. of heroin; all derivatives of morphine, cocaine, or their respective salts, codeine and any other alkaloid of opium which may be prescribed by order of the High Commissioner, tinctures and extracts or other medicinal preparations of cannabis indica); shaving brushes exported from Japan, China, Manchuria and Korea (shaving brushes exported from Europe are subject to inspection by the Department of Health).

Living plants and bees must be accompanied by a certificate, signed by a competent agriculturist in the country of origin, to the effect that they are free from disease.

All essences, extracts of oils intended or suitable for use in the manufacture of spurious or imitated beverages.

Any bottle, cask or other vessel containing wine or spirituous liquors, which does not bear a label clearly indicating the true nature of the contents, the full name of the manufacturer or responsible exporting agent and the country of origin.
